



***Free Knitting Pattern***  
**Lion Brand® Baby Soft® Boucle**  
**Plush Striped Baby Afghan**  
Pattern Number: L70143B



## **SKILL LEVEL – Beginner**

### **SIZE**

About 30 x 35 in. (76 x 89 cm)

### **MATERIALS**

- Lion Brand® Baby Soft® Boucle (Art. #918)
  - 144 Lavender 1 ball (A)
  - 103 Candy Pink 1 ball (B)
  - 184 Peach 1 ball (C)
  - 150 Cloud 1 ball (D)
  - 101 Ballet Pink 1 ball (E)
- Lion Brand® stitch marker
- Lion Brand® large-eyed blunt needle



### **ADDITIONAL MATERIALS**

Circular knitting needle size 10 (6 mm), 29 in. (73.5 cm) long

### **GAUGE**

14 stitches = about 4 in. (10 cm) in Garter stitch (knit every stitch on every row).  
BE SURE TO CHECK YOUR GAUGE.

### **NOTES**

1. The Afghan is worked in one piece using just the knit stitch.
2. A circular needle is used to accommodate the large number of stitches. Work back and forth in rows on the circular needle as if working on straight needles.

### **AFGHAN**

With A, cast on 105 stitches.

Work in Garter stitch (knit every stitch on every row) until piece measures about 7 in. (18 cm) from beginning.

Cut A, leaving a yarn tail about 6 in. (15 cm) long to weave in later.

Change to B (to change to B, just begin knitting the next row with B) and knit across, mark the side of the Afghan that is facing you as you work this row as the right side.

Continue in Garter stitch with B until B stripe measures about 7 in. (18 cm). As you get close to the 7 in. (18 cm) measurement, keep an eye on your knitting and make sure that the last row you knit is a wrong side row – the wrong side is the side of the Afghan that doesn't have a marker.

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Change to C.

Continue in Garter stitch, working 7 in. (18 cm) with C, then D and finally E – always remembering to work the last row of each color stripe on the wrong side and the first row of the new color yarn on the right side.

Bind off.

### **FINISHING**

Weave in ends.
